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


Surprise Make-A-Wish Celebration for Jamontae

This year, La Rabida took celebrating World Sickle Cell Day to new heights. On June 19th, eight-yearold sickle cell patient, Jamontae, thought he was coming to the hospital for a routine appointment. Little did he know that he would be welcomed with a surprise send-off celebration hosted by the staff from La Rabida and Make-A-Wish Illinois to commemorate Jamontae's wish being granted. What

was his wish, you ask? To go to Disney World. Jamontae has been a patient at La Rabida since he was an infant. Because of his long history at the hospital, Jamontae and his family have formed a special bond with staff. Jamontae's sickle cell nurse practitioner, Tanisha Jones, nominated him to Make-A-Wish earlier this year in hopes of helping his dream come true. La Rabida worked in partnership with Make-A-Wish Illinois to host the celebration on World Sickle Cell Day to honor the fight children like

Jamontae and his family left for their week-long trip to Disney World on June 23rd. When asked what he was most excited about, Jamontae said he couldn't wait to ride all of the different rides and indulge in the unlimited, all you can eat ice cream.



Jacob is a ten-month old patient who was aboard the S.S. La Rabida for nearly seven months, spending all of his life within the walls of a hospital. Because Jacob was diagnosed with congenital genetic abnormalities before birth and was born at nearly 34 weeks, doctors were concerned about his chances of survival. "Jacob was not well even when I was pregnant," shares Yessy, Jacob's mother. "The doctors told me that Jacob was not going to survive when delivered."

After birth, Jacob was placed on a trach and a ventilator as well as a G-tube to meet his nutritional needs. Even though he still relies on those pieces of technology, Jacob has made great progress since arriving at La Rabida. "He does not vomit anymore, he can move a lot more on his own and breathe much better," says Yessy. "He's also able to grab items, which he wasn't able to do before." Jacob worked closely with our speech, physical and occupational therapists while aboard our inpatient unit. Jacob's medical team worked day-in and day-out to help him grow stronger in every area of his life. The care he received while at La Rabida has helped him gain a new set of skills that will carry him through the rest of his life. "Jacob is growing a lot faster than when he first came to La Rabida. I've seen him sing and communicate with his physical therapist which has been amazing."

However, even with all the progress Jacob has made, there is still a long way to go. "Unfortunately, he is not able to crawl or walk like other children. I would like for Jacob to be able to do those things on his own in the long term," shares Yessy. With support from the medical team at La Rabida, Jacob is working towards those goals every day.

Spending extended periods of time at a hospital can be challenging, but with the support of our staff, we hope to make the experience as pleasant as possible. "Our experience at La Rabida has been excellent. From the nurses to the security driving outside to Mary in the cafeteria," shares Yessy. "Everyone has been absolutely amazing."


Happy 123rd Birthday, La Rabida!


