Ezekiel has a lot to celebrate this summer. Not only is he a recent Whitney Young High School graduate, he also graduated from La Rabida to adult care after receiving services here for 16 years!

Ezekiel has right side hemiparesis, which means he is partially paralyzed, caused by a stroke during pregnancy. During his 16 years as a patient at La Rabida, Ezekiel received ongoing occupational and physical therapy, serial casting on his ankles, and bracing and splinting for his arm.

When he first came to La Rabida, he was a shy six-yearold boy, hesitant about his care. However, over the years Ezekiel formed trusting relationships with his therapists and doctors allowing him to maximize his potential. In fact, Ezekiel has created personal art for many therapists at La Rabida, three of whom have his beautiful paintings hanging in their homes.

Kim VanKlompenburg, one of Ezekiel's physical therapists, has known and worked with Ezekiel since he started coming to La Rabida in 2011.

"Over the years, he struggled with the bracing and splinting, and the feelings of being different at school," says VanKlompenburg. "But every time, with the help and support of his amazing family, Ezekiel always rose above."

According to his therapists, Ezekiel's family are generous, considerate and grateful for the services provided by La Rabida.

"At La Rabida, not only did the staff help Ezekiel with his disabilities, they also made him feel special," says Tina, Ezekiel's mom. "Everyone truly cared about him and his well-being. He wasn't just treated as a patient, but as a person."

Ezekiel is a kind, polite, mature and hard-working young man. An accomplished artist and track and cross country athlete, he is off to college in Florida this fall, where he will focus on training for the Paralympics.

To Audi and all of our patients with sickle cell, your well-being is and will continue to be an important part of our mission.

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
#### **Annual Board Meeting**

#### **Memories and Movie Trailers**



We recently reconnected with former patient and lifelong Chicagoan Dennis Conway. Denny, now 79 and a retired Chicago Public School math teacher, was an inpatient at La Rabida for a period of 8 months in 1952 and 1953 when he was treated for rheumatic fever.

During Denny's eight month stay at La Rabida, he remembers movie nights, receiving four hormone shots, then two hours of activity after strict bed rest for weeks. Eventually, he graduated to no restrictions at all and could be out of bed whenever he wanted – something he appreciated a lot. "I've never been one to be good at sitting around. I'm always moving," shared Denny.

Denny continued his follow-up care at La Rabida until his teen years. His mother, Julia Conway, became dedicated to fundraising for La Rabida and did so with the Variety Club, which "adopted" La Rabida and highlighted patients in movie trailers, typically before double features. Denny remembers his mother traveling to "almost every movie theater in and around Chicago" to garner support for the children of La Rabida. She became so busy with the endeavor in the 1950's, the Conway's had to install a second home telephone for Julia to organize other volunteers in her fundraising efforts for the hospital.

On August 22, 1958, Denny and his mom attended the Bob Hope Testimonial Banquet which raised funds for La Rabida.

Denny has the program to this day with Mr. Hope and Jack Benny's autograph on the cover.

Denny and his wife Debbie are now retired and live in Chicago's Beverly neighborhood. They have 8 children and are expecting their 20th grandchild next month. Denny credits La Rabida for his healing at the time and says "I have had a blessed life and my mom was a real champion for La Rabida and its patients."

The Conway's have supported our mission for over three decades and we are grateful for their continued support for the "gem on the lake."
